WHY INFLATION FERSISTS

The following figures published June 4, 1970, by the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics show one of the reasons why inflation persists today in our economy.

In the non-farm private sector, out-put per man hour has increased each year since 1966 by 0.7, 1.9, and 2.6% per year, respectively. During this same period compensation per man hour increased 6.0, 7.4, and 6.8% per year, respectively. Unit labor costs during the same years 1967, 1968, and 1969 increased 4.9, 3.9, and 6.4%, respectively.

Does anyone really think we can hold the line on prices of goods and services in the face of figures like these?

Until we bring productivity increases in line with labor costs, the "fight" to control inflation in our economy is only wishful thinking.

THREE SHORT, SHARP BLASTS THAT'S ALL IT TAKES

Believe it or not, but an ordinary dime store whistle might someday save your life.

According to the National Safety Council, many campers carry a small whistle when they're out in the field so they can signal for help in an emergency.

Three short, sharp blasts is all it takes. It's a widely recognized call for help.

The council says it's also a good idea to equip your small fry with whistles ... preferably attached to their clothing so that when they get lost, the whistles won't.

Just one small complication, however. You've got to teach junior not to use the whistle except in case of an emergency -- which does not include needing a drink of water at midnight. Remember: three short, sharp blasts are a clear call for help.

THE PAST AND FUTURE TENTS OF CAMPING SAFETY - HELPFUL HINTS FROM THE NATIONAL SAFETY COUNCIL

"Roughing it" on a camping trip does not mean intentionally making yourself uncomfortable. An uncomfortable, irritable and disappointed camper is prone to careless disregard of safety habits, says the National Safety Council.

Always carry a reliable compass when you go camping, hunting, or fishing in some remote areas. Rely on the compass - not on your sense of direction.

Carelessness is a major cause of forest fires. Always be sure your matches and cigarettes are completely out before discarding them, and never leave an unattended campfire burning.

A good first aid kit should go with you on every camping trip. It may seldom be used, but it must be there on those rare occasions when it is needed.

Campers should keep in mind that all wild animals - however small or tame they look - can be dangerous, either because of their teeth or claws or the diseases they carry.

Before starting an open campfire, clear away all combustible material - grass, sticks, dead leaves, and the like. "Clear the ground an axe-length around" is an old lumberjack rule. Still better is to add the length of your arm to that of the axe, says the National Safety Council.
