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Medical Insurance Premiums Deductible for Income Tax

As the New Year rolls around, we can begin thinking about our income tax returns. Listed here are the amounts you may use for deduction purposes.

In the past the Federal Income law has permitted you to deduct on an itemized return one-half of your medical insurance premiums up to \$150 with the remainder being counted along with other medical expenses that are in excess of 3% of your income. Please check your 1970 tax instruction booklet to determine how to handle the premium deduction for 1970. Here are the figures you need:

*there were 27 paydays in 1970

In this table, find your base payday earnings shown on your paycheck stub. Don't include overtime or shift differential pay. In the appropriate column to the right, find the amount of your payday contribution to medical coverage. Multiply that amount by the number of paydays you contributed (27 if you worked the full year). The total gives you the amount you may use.




