

ISO 9001 Campaign Underway by Tom Fioretti

he Falls Church Division ISO 9001 campaign is in the final stage of the certification process. National Quality Assessors (NQA) will review our policies and

procedures month in order to assess compliance with the ISO standard. Additionally, in anticipation of the NQA visit, auditors from Quality and Engineering are conducting pre-survey audits of our internal work instructions and em-

Record Earnings Reported. Raytheon Company reported record second quarter earnings of \$209.4 million, or \$.88 per share, on record sales of \$3.112 billion. "We continued to strengthen Raytheon as a diversified commercial company and we remain a top tier player in a consolidating defense industry due to the performance of Raytheon E-Systems," said Dennis J. Picard, Raytheon's chairman and chief executive officer. "Raytheon's second quarter was led by increased overall commercial sales and profits, and we ended the quarter with a record total backlog."

Pentagon Rankings Released. Raytheon has placed sixth on the Pentagon's recently announced list of the 100 largest defense contractors for Fiscal Year 1995 with \$2.9 billion in prime contract awards.

SEPG Initiates Improvement Plan by JoAn Ferguson

The FCD Software Engineering Process Group (SEPG) was formed in November 1995 to direct and coordinate the Division's software process improvement efforts. As a result, the FCD software process improvement efforts were redefined and refocused with the following primary goals identified:

- Increase project performance predictability by developing better software cost estimates and increasing our project planning and tracking activities.
- Enhance quality and productivity by documenting, teaching and carrying out the Division's best practices.

These goals are common to many organizations in our industry, and the Software Engineering Institute (SEI) has defined a framework for guiding software process improvement efforts. This framework is documented in the SEI's Capability Maturity Model (CMM) for Software.

The SEPG established a hierarchical organizational structure to manage our software process.

The CMM requires that the organization's standard software process be documented. Again, a hierarchical framework was defined. Recognizing that no single process will meet the requirements of all programs at our Division, the SEPG decided that each project will describe the tailoring of the standard software process


in a Software Development Plan.

The focus of the SEPG's recent efforts has been in documenting the "best practices" currently in use at Falls Church. The SEPG recently released its first version of the FCD Software Practices Manual (SPM). The SPM may be viewed from the Division's SEPG home page: http:// recsys1.se.melpar. esys.com:80/info/ sepg. Hard copy

versions will also be available.

An overview of the SEPG's process improvement activities and the SPM has been presented at several software process briefings at the Falls Church and Fredericksburg facilities. Employees wishing to attend future SEPG briefings should contact Q.T. Nguyen at qnguyen@fc or ext. 4010.

the-art airborne reconnaissance system. The system will use reconnaissance equipment developed and integrated by Raytheon E-Systems and will be installed on four Hawker 800XP jet aircraft made by Raytheon Aircraft. Four additional Hawker 800XP aircraft will also be purchased by the Republic of Korea for similar purposes. The value of the contract for Raytheon could exceed \$250 million over the life of the program. Work on the program will be performed at the Greenville Division and is expected to begin in the fall of 1996.

Strategic Alliance Announced. Raytheon E-Systems has entered into a strategic alliance with Instrumental, Inc. of St. Paul, Minnesota, and GENIAS Software GmbH of Neutraubling, Germany. The companies will jointly develop and market advanced systems management products and services that substantially improve the capability, productivity and return on investment of government and commercial organizations using distributed, high performance computer systems.



Notification of Asbestos-Containing Materials

Most buildings constructed before 1980 include some form of asbestos-containing material (ACM). The main building of the Falls Church facility falls into this category, and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) requires that employees be notified of ACM in that portion of the facility.

Specifically, ACM includes the main building's older, dark brown floor tiles, most of which have been covered with carpet or new tile. It also includes tape on duct edges and insulation on hot/cold waters pipes. These ACM areas are not accessible to the general Raytheon E-Systems employee.

Annual surveys of our facility are conducted by a licensed asbestos inspector from the Facilities Department, and needed remediation of ACM is performed as required. Air monitoring has been performed throughout the building, and all testing indicates that employees have not been exposed to airborne ACM.


Worth Noting
